Background: Sanganer

- Home to high quality handicrafts including block printing, handmade paper, blue pottery
 - Over the years, hand block printing has been largely displaced by screen printing
 - And vegetable dyes by chemical dyes
 - (Also shift away from local hand production of raw material for paper)
- As a result, a conflict has arisen between preserving tradition, production using hand printing and vegetable dyes, which is environment friendly vs. screen printing, chemical dyes, and high levels of pollution, water shortage

Focus of the Study

Identification of key problems faced by

- Block Printing
- Handmade Paper

as a result of financial and economic slow down in Sanganer and identification of policy priorities



Methodology

- Rapid Assessment through semi structured interviews with exporters, traders, workers, officials, academics, NGOs....
- Qualitative methods
- Attempt to verify through triangulation
- Stakeholder consultation in Jaipur, June 17

Effort has been to identify broad contours of the problems facing workers and enterprises



Sanganer: Current Scenario

 Market demand for handicrafts overall has been falling over the last 3 years


Block printing:


- Over the last one year, fall of 30-40% experienced by respondents
- Large domestic market has cushioned the impact
- Worst affected group of workers is the semi skilled, mainly women and migrated workers.

Handmade paper:

- Over the last one year, drop in demand of 40-50 % experienced
- Small domestic market
- Worst affected group: migrated workers





Workers and Employment Issues

- -Traditional craftspersons from chhipa community (block printing), kagzi community (handmade paper), home based production
- -Now both large and small units, enterprise + home based work
- -Large number of migrated workers from other districts and other states
- -Payment on both piece-rate basis and daily wage basis (200-350 a day is usual range of wages)
- Female to male ratio is 30 : 70 in printing units.
- More women in home-based jobs.
- -Women more into semi-skilled job than skilled (printing)
- -Social security measures are negligible.
- (Schemes exist but limited registration eg Artisan credit card by DCH)

Challenges

- Limited presence of trade unions or other forms of organising – lack of processes to develop a joint voice
- Presence of migrant workers need recognition, ensure registration, housing, health, education
- Need for a forum with representation of craft workers, community members, enterprises, design institute, government officials, to come to a shared approach and ensure compliance

Markets

Production process:

 Awareness building about vegetable dyes as environment friendly products

Expanding domestic market:

- Participation in national trade fairs and exhibitions
- Systems for providing market information, demand trends etc.
- Direct help government orders for handmade paper (visiting cards, letterhead....)



Challenges

- Active role of the government in seeking to expand markets linked to taking decision on development trajectory (banning screen printing, chemical dyes)?
- For exports, obtaining 'GI' registration may help?

Challenges: Policy framework

- Defining a long term trajectory which is tradition and environment sensitive: Forum for discourse to give space for various stakeholders in identifying development trajectory for Sanganer?
- Once defined, stimulus package: cluster development approach

Planning the future

• Plan of action will need to be based on a more careful study capturing the nuances and disaggregating the sector further: impact on different groups and products likely to vary.
